Jesus said, "To the church in Ephesus...I know your deeds, your hard work, and your perseverance. I know that you cannot tolerate the wicked, and that you have tested those who claim to be apostles but are not, and have found them false. You have persevered and have endured hardships for my name, and have not grown weary. Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken your first love. Remember the height from which you have fallen. Repent and do the things you did at first." Revelation 2:2-5.

In our Sunday Adult Education Class, we are learning from John's Letter of Revelation. John wrote this letter to a particular people, in a particular place, for a particular time in the first century AD. While it is a letter written FOR us, it is not a letter written TO us. Revelation is not an encrypted key that helps us unlock the future or end of the world. As part of the Biblical Apocalyptic literature, it helps us to discern what the Lord is saying to us today.

Author and Pastor Matt Chandler in his video series *The Overcomers* states, "Revelation cannot mean for us what it did not mean for them" 2000 some years ago. Our job as modern day believers is to hear about what John saw and then take it to heart. So what then is the Spirit of Jesus trying to say to us through it?

In the excerpt of Revelation noted above, Jesus addresses seven churches in Asia minor. While he has some good things to say about each, he also confronts their flaws. Take the Church in Ephesus for example. They were really being faithful during a time when great persecution had broken out against Christians by the Roman Empire. However, they were becoming weary and losing their passion for following Jesus that they had at the beginning. Their spark was starting to go out. So Jesus tells them... You need to repent. Turn back toward me and rekindle the love you once had.

It is interesting that this idea of forsaking a first love comes at this time of year when we remember Valentines Day and our special human relationships. Most couples that have been married for a length of time could admit that over many years, a relationship ebbs and flows. They can go from being madly and passionately in love, to simply becoming comfortable and complacent with one another. I don't think that Jesus expects us to always have the same youthful feelings when we were young. But He does expect us to kindle the flames that we once had for each other. To remember how deeply in love we once were.

We all could take some time to remember what it was like when we were first following Jesus. Remember how radical it seemed? Remember how risky it was? Remember how this new relationship made you feel so alive? That's what Jesus wants for each of us. To share in the life giving love that He has with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

# FLOWERS FOR REMEMBRANCE

We are launching a new initiative we call "Flowers for Remembrance". Anyone may bring a bouquet of flowers to Sunday Service to remember and thank God for a loved one, an anniversary, a birthday, or any special event that has occurred in their life. The bouquet will be placed on the small table in front of the pulpit. We will also list your name and the name of whom you are remembering in the Sunday bulletin for the day. In order for the remembrance information to appear in the bulletin, however, we need you to use the signup sheet on the bulletin board in the entrance to the Fellowship Hall. If more than one person would like to remember someone on a day, we will make arrangements to display the additional bouquet in the sanctuary. If you choose to participate we ask that you:

- Bring the flowers in some type of container with water. We would prefer to not have loose flowers laid on the table.
- Come to the service a few minutes early before the start of the prelude in order to place the bouquet on the table. The Ushers will be able to assist you in bouquet placement.
- Select flowers that have minimal scent.

The required parking spaces were specified by the Clark County Permitting Office when we built our new sanctuary in 2014. It is based on the number of seats in our sanctuary. We were required to have a specified amount of handicap and non-handicap parking to accommodate our estimated Sunday number of attendees. In the future, our long range facilities masterplan does account for more handicap parking spaces to be added in a new parking area on the south side of the playground and sanctuary. In the meantime, if you are in need of handicap parking, please try to come early enough prior to worship to either get a designated handicap parking space or to park in a regular space closer to the handicap accessible areas. # SPOTLIGHT ON OUR MEMBERS



They are the best huggers! At our 2016 harvest party, Bill and Kay Gibson arrived in costume as hug therapists. Kay is a lifelong hugger, but Bill learned a hug's therapeutic value through his counselling work. This couple introduced "the Hanging of the Greens" to Cascades, bringing it from their church in Norfolk, VA. Former elder Bill heads up our bowling ministry and also advocates for world peace at prayer time. Former deacon Kay helped lead our quilt ministry founded by Carolynn Zenk.

Chicago-born Bill grew up south of that city. When Bill was in the Navy in San Diego, his parents (mom Jean later attended Cascades) moved to Brookings, OR, halfway between Bill in San Diego and Bill's sister in

Kennewick, WA. Lorella Kay, whose first name is taken from a former Oregon town, was born in Baker (now Baker City), OR, and later lived in Troy, OR; Troy, ID; Portland; Lewiston, ID and Clarkston, WA.

At age 17, Bill, a day manager at a Chicago drive-in, visited a recruiting office along with a friend. They were offered a "buddy plan" so they could join together, with both to be released at age 21. However, Bill serving as a submarine engineman, a job vital to the Navy, was involuntarily extended and promised a promotion to E-5, Petty Officer 2nd class. That prompted him to enlist for longer to get A/C refrigeration training, increasing opportunity for employment in civilian life. Bill is proud of his service on a submarine, even getting a tattoo of "DBF" (diesel boats forever)! He retired as a Master Chief Petty Officer (E-9), with 26 years service.

Kay worked for Omark Industries, maker of .22 bullets, as an office assistant when... KABOOM!...the roof blew off! She then became a payroll clerk at the Clarkston mayor's office, She enjoyed that job partly because every day the mayor would teach a new word, including "omphaloskepsis," which means navel contemplation, but she soon began Naval contemplation. Kay, with two children, having ended an abusive marriage at age 28 joined the Navy to become an aviation electronics technician. The next day, realizing the tool box she carried far outweighed her tiny frame, transferred to a clerical job where she excelled. She retired as a Senior Chief Petty Officer (E-8) with 20 years.

While in the Navy in London, Bill and Kay met. Bill was in a drug abuse counselling school and a student (another Kay) told her friend, Kay, about Bill. Kay invited Bill to her boss's house for Thanksgiving dinner where she loaned Bill her car as she didn't drive in the city, and then she looked down, saw Bill's hands and realized "those are the hands I want to grow old with." In 1985, they married, and will be celebrating 40 blissful years this May. From London they moved to Norfolk, VA, where Kay, having learned how to take Navy tests, scored 100% on her occupational test (and no one scores that), was investigated, and finally officially accepted as honestly earned! There Bill went to work for the Veterans Administration and eventually made his way to the Northwest, where he had always wanted to live, to work for the Portland Veteran's Administration. Two 3,000 mile driving trips later, they found a home where Kay could keep her five cats. The yellow pages found them a church that "fit the Bill," and so we are privileged to have them at Cascades!


