

Sunday October 6 is World Community Sunday. As we gather for worship around the globe, it is the day when we celebrate the unity that we Christians have in Christ. A unity is not based on sameness, but a beautiful diversity as unique people groups from around the world confess that we are part of one body, one Spirit, one hope, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. A unity that should bring a bond a peace not only to the church, but to the world.

But our world is not at peace and neither is the American Christian Church for that matter. Daily we see heartbreaking news coverage of a world at war whether in the Middle East or Russia and Ukraine. No matter what outside entities do to try to persuade cease fires or attempts at diplomacy, all efforts seem to fall on deaf ears and the matter only seems to get worse. And at home, bitter divisive politics within the American Church have marred the unity that Jesus intended. It all seems completely hopeless and beyond hope. What are we to do?

In the scripture above, the Apostle Paul was writing to a group of new Gentile believers in Jesus Christ. They were apparently struggling to leave behind the old way the pagan world had shaped them and instead live into a new identity as Christians. Notice Paul's "urging". He is very concerned that they show people that they were Christians not by the way they forcibly pressed a sound theological argument but by the way they treated others...being humble and gentle; patient, loving, and peaceful. Do these sound familiar? They should because they are fruit of Jesus' Holy Spirit that is produced in our lives.

This is what we are focusing on at Sunday worship during our sermon time. The Fruit of the Spirit. I felt that in this season of ugly American politics that it was important for us to be reminded of what God expects from us. It doesn't mean that we shouldn't debate or explain why we think a particular political position is best for our country. But does mean that the Spirit in which we do it should be the same as Jesus would. Instead of vilifying our political "enemy" what if we saw them as fellow believers or Americans with whom we have more in common with than what divides us? What if we loved them in the same way that we wanted to be loved? What if we prayed for them and allowed the Holy Spirit to melt our hearts toward them and loved them instead?

I truly believe that we cannot expect the world or our leaders to be peaceable people unless it begins with us. As Saint Francis of Assisi prayed, "Lord, make me a channel of your peace, that where there is hatred, I may bring love; that where there is wrong, I may bring the spirit of forgiveness."

So may we be committed to be peaceful people in our community and extending that peace to one another. And may we see God's kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven. Before it can take place on the world stage, it must begin with us.

Michelle has been an incredible member of our ministry team with many talents and gifts and whose shoes will be challenging to fill. But as grandchildren have debuted, Michelle and Andy understandably want to spend as much time in Montana as possible. Because of this, the Personnel Committee will begin posting a job description as soon as possible to replace Michelle. Michelle has graciously agreed to stay on to train her replacement on the many aspects of her job. In the meantime, we will be planning a way to celebrate Michelle's retirement and send her off with God's and Cascades' blessing!

FRIENDS OF THE CARPENTER

Friends of the Carpenter (FOTC) is a day shelter ministry serving unhoused members of our community and one of the nonprofits supported by the Cascades Church Benevolence Fund. Cascades has enjoyed a long-standing relationship with FOTC. It has recently undergone a change in leadership and is clarifying and strengthening its focus. They feel called to provide dignity services and support those who are marginalized by things such as being houseless or having non-traditional sexual orientation or legal records. They also seek to contribute to spiritual growth among both those served and those serving.

FOTC is located near the far west stretch of the Port of Vancouver near Mill Plain, an area that has a lot of houseless tent shelters. People walk or share rides to the FOTC workshop that provides one of the very few public showers and laundry facilities in the county. Dignity begins with being clean and having clean clothes. It is further supported by having a place outside their tent homes to spend waking hours with something meaningful to do. People are invited to participate in woodworking to help raise money for operation of the facility and program. Simple tasks such as sanding pocket crosses or fish signs up to tasks requiring a higher degree of skill are available depending on interest and ability. Staff work to foster community among those choosing to participate at FOTC.

FOTC is working to restore and improve its income streams that were disrupted by the pandemic. They have submitted a major grant request that may be awarded late this year, but there is work that needs to be supported now. The showers currently are only available three days a week from 10am to 2pm because of staffing shortages. They would like to pay someone who has used the services and has demonstrated reliability to clean and manage the facilities. They have been using volunteers for this work but volunteerism has declined here as it has throughout our society. The Benevolence Board is currently in conversation with FOTC about providing interim support for these needs while their grant application is considered.

FOTC is working to move to a model of fundraising that offers small events where people can come together to celebrate and support the programs. How to assist in these events is also under consideration by the Benevolence Board.

As a new member of Cascades Benevolence Board, I will be serving as the liaison for FOTC and would be delighted to talk with you about any questions or comments you would like to share. Please join me in praying that all who minister and/or are served at Friends of the Carpenter continue to know they are surrounded by God's loving care.

CASCADES BENEVOLENCE BOARD NEWS

The Cascades Benevolence Board met recently to consider which organizations to provide Fall Grants. While there are many deserving nonprofits, we decided this year to simplify and reframe our giving based on the wisdom from the book, Helping Without Hurting in Church Benevolence. This resource is published by The Chalmers Center in Chattanooga, Tennessee which helps churches walk with materially poor people. They suggest that all benevolent giving falls in three categories: relief or immediate assistance following a particular crisis; rehabilitation or assistance that helps people get back to their pre-crisis condition; and development which aims to foster long term strategies and tools so people don't fall back into a financial crisis situation. After critical review, we found that a significant proportion of our benevolence grants to families was relief oriented and have chosen instead to be more balanced between the three categories. As a result, we have granted \$5,000 to the Winter Housing Overflow Program operated by The Council for the Homeless which shelters men and families; \$5,000 to each the Vancouver Public Schools and Evergreen School District Housing Support funds overseen by The Council for the Homeless; \$10,000 to Friends of the Carpenter in support of their dignity services program; \$10,000 to both Family Promise of Clark County and Open House Ministries, each family shelters providing all three types of assistance; and finally \$5,000 to The Giving Closet a free thrift clothing and home goods store for under resourced people. We were sorry to see Tim Rettberg-Speed leave the board following a recent move to Seattle but were glad to welcome Lindsay Winsor as our newest board member.

SPOTLIGHT ON OUR MEMBERS

If you attended Cascades' craft fair this year, you may have discovered lilac scented candles and fragrant lavender heating pads. They are the creative work of Debbie Engley, who, along with Jeff, are one of the newer couples currently joining us for worship at Cascades. Debbie also helped this year shepherding our children at VBS.

Debbie, born in Rolla, ND, moved at age 5 to Kirkland, WA, then moved again at age 8 to Palmdale, CA. At 19, she chose to spend time with her aunt and uncle in Wenatchee, WA, and found employment with Pizza Inn. Jeff, born and raised in Wenatchee, graduated from Wenatchee High School. He found employment at Pizza Inn. There he also found his future bride! They married in 1983, and both their daughters were born in Wenatchee as well. He followed that with 25 years at ADP in Portland serving as an electronics technician and computer programmer. For the past nine years, Fuel Medical in Camas has employed him as a web developer, the last three years of which he worked from home. He expects to retire sometime within the next two years.

Jeff and Debbie comfortably enjoy life at home. Jeff finds himself helping Debbie with her candle business. They, as so many of us do, relax with trips to the Coast, where they enjoy the beauty of the area in which we live. As for other travel, they enjoy visiting Southern California to see Debbie's family. Jeff's work has taken him to Philadelphia, PA, and Birmingham, AL, and he has traveled for pleasure just out of the country to Vancouver, BC, and Tijuana, Mexico. They hope someday to experience our nation's history by visiting the East Coast.

They attended Columbia Presbyterian Church for eight years, but decided on Cascades as they sought a somewhat smaller church closer to home. They feel people here are friendly and easy to get to know. As we get to know them, we enjoy them as well. Jeff appreciates that people here prayed for his mother as she faced hip surgery this summer. Please continue to pray for her.


